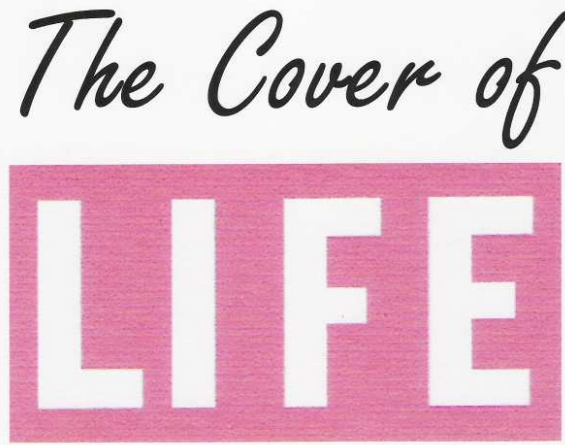

Set in the midst of World War II, *The Cover of LIFE* tells the story of 3 soldiers' wives living with their mother-in-law in a small southern town while their husbands are off to war. LIFE magazine hears of the story and sends writer Kate Miller to interview the family and she learns more about



herself and life, both upper and lower case, than she bargained for. We are well into rehearsals and I could not ask for a better team. What an honour it is to work with these men and women; not only the actors on stage but all those behind the scenes. Thank you all for making my job so easy.

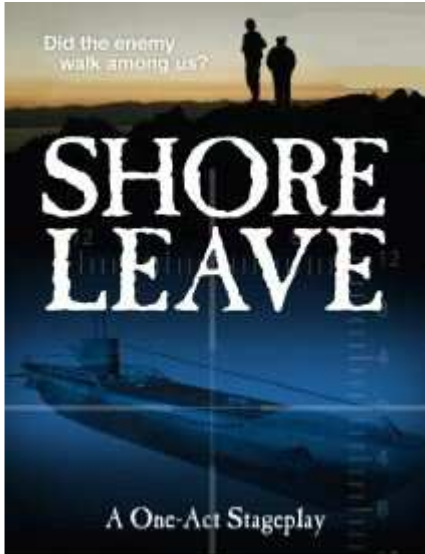
Dartmouth Players Tickets

The young German submariner Joseph makes a visit in disguise to a Nova Scotian village for nothing more than fresh air and food and the adventure. But on meeting a village war widow and the village priest, he gets more than he bargained for.

Piercing, raw, uplifting and tragic, *Shore Leave* takes a Nova Scotian myth from World War II and goes straight to the heart of the matter.

To play the role of the German submariner, we are looking for a man in his 20's or early 30's. Should be plausible in looks as a German. Character speaks English without an accent. The play will run September 16 to 25, 2010.

Dartmouth Players proudly announces its line-up for the 2010-2011 season.

The season will open in September, with the presentation of **Shore Leave**, written by local playwright, Sean Kelly. Posing the question, "Did the enemy walk among us?", this play was inspired by a modern Maritime myth: namely that during World War II, German submarine crew members secretly visited our shores.

In November, the longest-running musical of all time, **The Fantasticks**, by Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt, will charm audiences with wonderful music and a time-honoured story of young love.

In late January, we will feature **Boston Marriage**, a blisteringly witty comedic satire by David Mamet, which presents the lives of two women in Victorian-era America who eschew marriage, defiantly choosing to live with one another instead.

Funny Money by Ray Cooney opens in late March. For fans of the rip-roaring, high-speed, door-slamming British farce, this one's for you! What happens when Joe-Average-Englishman opens his briefcase and discovers 1.5 million pounds inside?

Finally in June, you will be treated to a gentler, warm-all-over kind of comedy, **Be My Baby** by Ken Ludwig. Take one irascible old man and one uptight mature woman, and add one adorable baby. Then watch the fun unfold!

We can't wait to see all these outstanding plays come to life on our stage. We know you will be eager to take part too!

The Importance of Being Earnest

Oscar would have been extremely happy to attend Dartmouth Players to see these actors do justice to his masterpiece. Our director brought the script to life, designed and dressed the stage and proved that young people have a place in the theatre. The backstage crew did wonders in bringing the design to fruition, changing the stage between acts, and preparing the food for a



hungry Algernon under the direction of our competent stage manager. Our stage always presents problems for the lighting people, which were overcome by the innovative floor lighting designed for this set.

It was a pleasure to watch these actors present their characters to the audience. The haughty Lady Bracknell dominated the characters with her aristocratic charm. Miss Prism, so confident as a governess, became reticent when confronted by Lady B. The Reverend Chasuble from Scotland, lent an air of sophistication to the English aristocracy. Lane served his master with dreadful distinction, while Merriman had us all laughing with his *shaky* performance. Gwendolyn and Cecily became good friends, got into a cat fight and ended up as sisters. Algernon and Earnest fed off each other, and showed us what two friends in real life could do to characters on a stage.

Our audience verbal comments at the end of the play were most heartening. Thank you to all for supporting community theatre. It was our pleasure to bring this play to you.

ABOUT OUR DIRECTOR FOR *The Cover of LIFE*

Our last director for the 2009 - 2010 season is Ian MacDermid. I recently sat down with Ian and asked him a few questions regarding his interest in community theatre and his choice to direct our next production, *The Cover of LIFE*.



DP: I know you have been with Dartmouth Players for over 20 years now; what was the allure that brought you through our doors?

Ian: I have loved the stage for as long as I can remember and when I came to Dartmouth Players and saw a play done by people who were just like me, not professionals, I just about burst, and was blown away by the fact that ordinary people got to do this and so I came back for the next auditions.

DP: What is it about community theatre that has kept you involved for so long?

Ian: Every production brings something that is new, whether it is a new show, new people, new sets. It is always different than the one before and therefore brings on a new challenge.

DP: You are also a member of our board of directors. How do you see your role on the board, influencing our theatre's future?

Ian: I like to think that I see things differently, so I always like to see us go in different and new directions - like using multi-media such as TV's and projectors on the set. I wasn't the first to use multi-media, but I have expanded on the idea in different projects I've been involved with.

DP: What was it about *The Cover of LIFE* that drew you to this particular play?

Ian: These people are very real people to me. They could be sisters or brothers of any one of us. It has heart. I can hear members of my own family, or any families, in the lines that are spoken.

DP: Do you see any similarities between what is happening with these women during the Second

World War and what is happening today to women who are left behind while their partners are in Afghanistan?

Ian: The separation is the same. The difference now is that there are now husbands with their wives over there. Communication is now easier and instant with the help of the internet. I think it would make it a little easier and make you feel a little less separated.

DP: Do you think the evolution of the women's movement has made it any easier for women to cope while their partners are away fighting?

Ian: Nothing can prepare us for living with that separation and anxiety. It all comes down to the same basic thing of being away from each other.

DP: What, if anything, do you hope our audience takes away from this production?

Ian: A little understanding of how hard it was for those left at home. The battle is not always fought on the battle fields and the victims of war are not always lost on the battle fields.

DP: What else would you like our patrons to know about Ian MacDermid?

Ian: I'm so grateful to have the opportunity to do this. I am so glad I get out to play with such a diverse group at Dartmouth Players.

DP: You are ending our season with a great production, and I want everyone to know that you will be directing our next season's opening main stage production with the musical, *The Fantasticks* - something for all of us to look forward to.

Ian: Yes! Come out and see all of our next season's productions!

If you find that you cannot attend a performance for which you have booked, PLEASE let us know by calling 465-PLAY as soon as possible. We would much prefer to resell that seat, rather than see it empty. Sometimes there is a waiting list of people hoping to purchase seats, who are disappointed when they cannot. Meanwhile there are empty seats in the theatre because the people who reserved them did not call to cancel. Please help us to remedy this situation. Also, we would ask patrons to only book as many seats as they know for certain they will need, to accommodate their party. Thank you for helping us to keep Dartmouth Players a valued and accessible place for as many people as possible.

Audience Comments– *The Importance of Being Earnest*

We had numerous comments from the audience on the quiz sheets that were inserted in the programs. Most of the comments were very positive, indicating that you enjoyed the presentation. I also received a lot of positive verbal comments from you when I was collecting the programs at the end of the play. As promised, I made about eight phone calls to those audience members that I considered needed a personal response.

We are still getting comments about people being bothered by perfume and other scents. We ask that you heed the no-scent policy at the theatre.

There were favourable comments about the Front of House staff, and the delicious treats they serve at intermission. The new comfortable seats were mentioned. A lot of good comments about the quiz but one person did not enjoy this quiz. You mentioned you liked the set and the costumes; our volunteers put a lot of work and effort to bring this play to you. We had a lot of people who were first-timers here, and you said you will be back. Thank you for that. One gentleman said that the print was too small for senior's eyes. I think that was because we put in a large glossary for terms used in the play, and this took up a lot of space.

Reserved seats were mentioned. Our policy is to have people identify special needs when they make reservations, and we assign them seats in the front. The remainder of the seats are then taken on a first come basis.

We did receive some suggestions for future plays. These will be passed to our play-reading committee.

Direct quote from one of the comments; "Fantastic experience from the minute you walk in. You all put on a fabulous show".
